Establishment



The Artillery Club salutes gunners of all ranks who have served Ireland with distinction, both at home and overseas, whilst maintaining exceptional operational readiness, unique legacy and solidarity, distinctive customs and traditions, valuable friendship, and the bond of camaraderie, since the establishment of the Artillery Corps on 23 March, 1923 in Islandbridge, Dublin.

The establishment of The Artillery Club, as recorded on pages 281 and 282 in “*Kildare Barracks*” written by Mark McLoughlin, and first published by Merrion in 2014 is described as follows: “In 1971 the officers of the Artillery Corps began to discuss establishing an Artillery Club. Discussions were held during the year and serving officers were consulted about the proposal. A drafting committee at Kildare consisting of Captain Michael P. Dunne, Lieutenant Ray Quinn, Lieutenant Paul Allen and Lieutenant Brian Wickham met to draft a constitution. The Artillery Club was formed in March 1973 on the fiftieth anniversary of the foundation of the Artillery Corps and the event was recorded in the Irish Times [21 March 1973]”:

‘Nobody who has ever served in the legal armed forces of John Bull’s Other Island needs any additional definition when there is a mention of the Corps. Admittedly, there are unfortunates – almost untouchables – in outfits like Infantry, Cavalry, Air Corps, Engineers, and even S. and T., who become unpurpled at the tacit assumption of the Gunners that their Corps needs no prefix, but members of the Corps ignore this’

Since its formal establishment in March 1973, the Artillery Club acknowledges the encouragement and support provided by the Director of Artillery, the Artillery School, and the Artillery Regiments.

Past Presidents

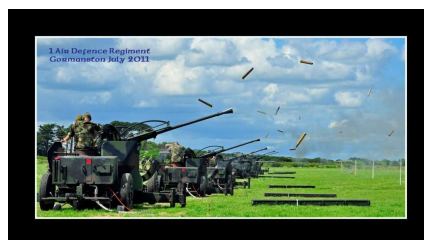

Club's Objectives



The main objective of the Artillery Club is to maintain, promote and foster the Artillery Corps unique legacy and solidarity, distinctive customs and traditions, lasting ethos, valuable fellowship, and the bond of camaraderie.

In addition, the Artillery Club supports the preservation for posterity the proud military heritage of the Irish Defence Forces Artillery Corps, and promotes professional excellence through sponsoring the Capt Jack Jones Best Student Award on Artillery Young Officers' and Detachment Commanders' [Number 1s'] Courses.

The Artillery Club provides a focal point for remembrance and comradeship, both of which are vital elements for the cohesiveness and operationality of the Artillery School and the Regiments of the Artillery Corps.

The Artillery Club promotes the study of military history associated with Field Artillery, Air Defence Artillery and Cost Defence Artillery, circulates appropriate publications and information, and supports military and regimental museums, in the maintenance and display of Artillery weapons, equipment, material and artefacts.

Arising from its Mission and compatible with the ethos of its members, the Club provides opportunities for appropriate activities, outings, visits and endeavours, while maintaining a positive image, and refraining from any political activity.

Finally, the Artillery Club facilitates a networking environment throughout Ireland, enabling serving and former officers of the Artillery Corps to maintain a lasting bond with colleagues, coupled with retaining contact with their parent Regiments, the Artillery School, and by extension the Corps.

Membership

Membership of the Artillery Club is open to all serving and retired commissioned Artillery officers of the Permanent Defence Force and the Army Reserve, (previously the Reserve Defence Force). Members pay an Annual Subscription of €10.

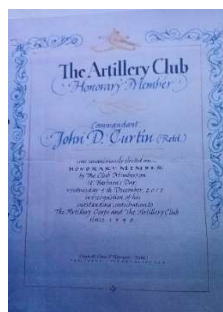

Honorary Membership



Honorary Membership is conferred on distinguished Artillery Officers. To date, four officers have been elected as Honorary Members: Commandant John D. Curtin (Retd) in 2013, Commandant Paddy Gillen (Retd) in 2014, Lieutenant-Colonel Jim Dawson in 2018, and Commandant John O'Brien in 2018.

Commandant John D. Curtin (Retd)





Commandant Curtin enlisted in the Local Defence Force on 13 October 1940. He completed his reserve service as Battery Commander 14 Battery, 7 Field Artillery Regiment (FCA). During his distinguished career, he fired the following Artillery weapons: 60th Pounder, 4.5 Howitzer, French 75s and the 25 Pounder.

The final firing of the 18 Pounder took place on 28 April 1974 in Glen Imaal, with the last round fired by Commandant John Curtin, Battery Commander 14 Battery, 2 Field Artillery Regiment.

Commandant Curtin He was elected the third President of the Artillery Club in 1975, and was also a former President of McKee Officers' Club (1989 and 1990). With a service spanning 36 years and 110 days, Commandant Curtin had the unique distinction of being retired longer than being in uniform. He was retired 37 years and 132 days, when he died peacefully on 12 June 2014, at the age of 94.

Commandant Paddy Gillen (Retd)

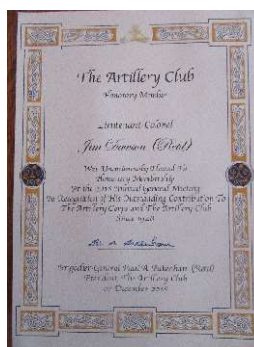


Residing in Galway, Paddy served in the 50 Infantry Battalion LDF from 1940 through 1943, when he enlisted in the 6 Commando, landed on Sword Beach, Normandy, and following the conclusion of hostilities on the European Front, served in Greece, Cyprus, Egypt and Lebanon.

Enlisting in the 44 Field Artillery Battery in May 1950, he was promoted to the rank of Commandant and appointed as Battery Commander (FCA), 1 Field Artillery Battery in 1970. This Battery subsequently became an organic Battery in the 8 Field Artillery Regiment (FCA) on reorganisation in 1979. He retired on 07 March 1982, with 42 years' service "under two flags" in the profession of arms.

On 08 December 2014, H.E. Jean-Pierre Thébault, French Ambassador to Ireland presented Commandant Gillen (Retd) with the *Chevalier de la Légion d'Honneur*, in recognition of his role in liberating France, in Normandy, during the Second World War. One of the last surviving Irish veterans of D-Day, he died on 27 December 2014.

Lieutenant-Colonel Jim Dawson (Retd)

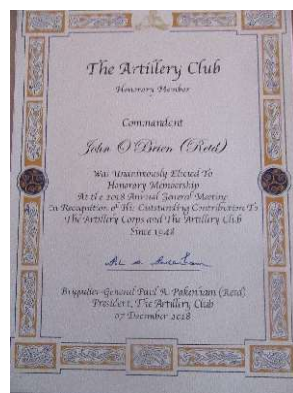




Lieutenant-Colonel Jim Dawson was born in Callan, County Kilkenny, on 12th April 1926, three years after the establishment of the Artillery Corps, and enlisted in the Local Security Force at the age of 14.

On commissioning, he was appointed to the Artillery Corps, completed his YO's course, and was posted to the 2 Field Artillery Regiment. Following service with the 1 Field Artillery Regiment, he was transferred to Spike Island, where he developed his renowned and legendary expertise in the art and science of Coast Defence Artillery. Lieutenant-Colonel Dawson served overseas with the 1 Infantry Group in the Congo, and in the Force Headquarters in Cyprus. Retiring in 1986, Jim kept a close eye on his nephews Colonel Mick who hosted the Club's Decades' Reunion in 2017, and Michael's brother Jim.

Commandant John O'Brien (Retd)



Residing in Bray, in 1944, Commandant O'Brien enlisted in the Local Security Force and transferred to the An Fórsa Cosanta Áitiúil on its establishment in 1947. Serving in the North Wicklow Battalion, he was commissioned in 1955. In 1959, as part of the Defence Forces reorganisation which included the integration of FCA subunits within Artillery Regiments,

Lieutenant O'Brien was one of ten FCA officers posted to Griffith Barracks to establish the 2 Ack-Ack Bty (FCA), a sub unit of the 1 AA Regiment. Promoted Commandant in 1982, he was appointed as Battery Commander of the 2 Air Defence Battery. Commandant O'Brien retired in 1984, after 40 commendable years' service in the Defence Forces.

Serving and retired officers of the disbanded 2 Air Defence Battery (FCA) assembled in the Stephen's Green Hibernian Club on Thursday, 10 February 2017, to mark the 90th birthday of Commandant O'Brien (Retd). Attendance included four of the founding officers of the 2 Ack Ack Battery, the President of the Artillery Club and other officers who served with John during his distinguished career in the Defence Forces.

The occasion on 10 February 2017, was notable in that An Taoiseach Mr Enda Kenny T.D. sent a letter congratulating him on his service to the Defence Forces and to the ESB from which he retired as Company Secretary. Commandant John O'Brien died peacefully on 15 April 2021 at the age of 94.

The surrounding ring is in the form of a laurel wreath and each arm of the cross bears a St. Brendan's knot. In the centre are the words **de bARR CALMÁCTA** (For Gallantry).

Reverse
The inscription "**An Bonn Míleata Calmáctá**" above a scroll for the particulars of the recipient.

Ribbon:
35mm Green with 6mm crimson edges



Obverse
A design of the ancient Irish warrior Cuchulainn with upraised sword standing in a war chariot drawn by two horses at the gallop. A charioteer crouched beside him whips the horses.

Reverse
Plain with the inscription "**An Bonn Seirbhíse Dearsca**" (The Distinguished Service Medal) around the outer edges.

Ribbon:
35mm wide in dark green with 5mm black stripes at the edges.

The Artillery Club salutes personnel of the Artillery Corps who were awarded An Bonn Míleata Calmachta (The Military Medal for Gallantry) and An Bonn Seirbhíse Dearsca (The Distinguished Service Medal), especially those who were, or continue to be members of the Artillery Club.

The Military Medal for Gallantry (MMG) was initiated in 1944 and is the highest military honour in the State. The medal may be awarded in recognition of the performance of any act of exceptional bravery or gallantry (other than one performed on War Service) arising out of, or associated with Military Service and involving risk to life or limb.

To date only eight awards of The Military Medal for Gallantry have been made. Captain Adrian Ainsworth MMG, Depot and School Artillery, was awarded The Military Medal for Gallantry while serving with the Heavy Mortar Troop, 46 Infantry Battalion UNIFIL, arising from action in At Tire on 07 April 1980.

The Distinguished Service Medal (DSM) was initiated in February 1964. The medal may be awarded in recognition of individual or associated acts of bravery, courage, leadership, resource of devotion to duty (other than any such acts of duty performed on War Service) arising out of, or associated with, service in the Defence Forces and not meriting the award of An Bonn Míleata Calmachta.

The following six personnel of the Artillery Corps were awarded The Distinguished Service Medal:

- Captain Tom Boyle DSM, 4 Field Artillery Regiment, Troop Commander, Heavy Mortar Troop, 38 Infantry Battalion (ONUC), December 1962 – January 1963.
- Sergeant John Quirke DSM, 4 Field Artillery Regiment, Heavy Mortar Troop, 38 Infantry Battalion (ONUC), December 1962 – January 1963.
- Corporal William Allen DSM, 4 Field Artillery Regiment, Heavy Mortar Troop, 38 Infantry Battalion (ONUC), December 1962 – January 1963.
- Lieutenant-General J.N. Bergin DSM, Chief of Staff, 1992 - 1995.
- Lieutenant-General Conor O'Boyle DSM, 2013 - 2015.

Club's Governance and Rules

The Rules of the Club are the basis of the Club's effective governance, transparency and accountability and are available on the Club's website. The current version of the Rules was adopted at the 2015 Annual General Meeting. The Club refrains from any political activity.





The management, control and direction of the Club are exercised by a Committee consisting of serving and retired Artillery officers, geographically spread over Ireland. Members of the Committee are elected by the Club's Annual General Meeting. The current tenure of office is for one year. Under the chair of the Club's President, the Committee arranges functions and activities as it deems appropriate to achieve the Club's objectives. The Club's President presents a report to the Annual General Meeting, which takes place during the month of December.

The Club is a non-profit organisation. Financial accounts are audited on a yearly basis and presented by the Club's Treasurer for approval at the Annual General Meeting.

Club's Communication Framework

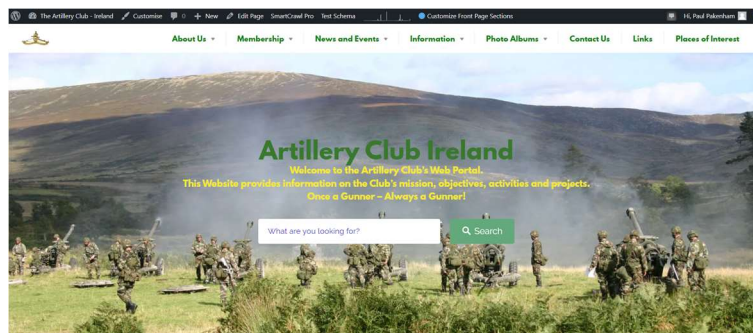


Through its communications framework, the Artillery Club maintains a lasting bond between serving and former officers of the Artillery Corps, its Regiments and School. The primary means of communications is the Club's website, followed by emails and where required normal post, and by word of mouth.

Through means of Newsletters, Information Briefs, Warning Orders, Coordinating Instructions, and regrettably Death Notifications, members are informed of prevailing issues.

Currently, a total of 357 individuals are currently on the "Artillery Community" Contact List which used for the distribution of Club information via emails, far exceeding the current Membership strength. The Contact List in 2015 was 122 individuals.

Club's Website



The Club's Website was formally launched at the 2015 AGM. The Committee remains indebted to Lieutenant-Colonel Stuart McNamara (Retd) for his technical advice and expertise, and for the provision of the Website's design and software. The Website is accessible through www.artilleryclub.ie



The Club is availing of the Website to enhance awareness of its mission, objectives, governance and membership. The Website provides a library of significant information on the Artillery Corps and the Artillery Club.

Safeguarding the legacy of the Artillery Corps, the Website provides a repository for appropriate articles and publications, and a library of relative information on the both the Artillery Corps and the Artillery Club.

Currently, the Website's Picture Gallery contains 36 albums reflecting the Artillery Corps, and 49 Albums covering the activities of the Artillery Club.

Partnership with Other Military Clubs



As part of its Outreach Programme, the Artillery Club has effective partnership with the McKee Officers' Club, the Cavalry Club, the Signal Officers Club and the Supply and Transport Club. Club members frequently avail of activities organised by the McKee Officers' Club, such as Theatre Outings and Tours.



Marking the 60th Anniversary of Defence Forces deployment to Lebanon, McKee Officers' Club conducted an extensive trip to the Lebanon in April 2018, which included visits to UNIFIL HQ and the Irish Battalion's Area of Operation. Participants included members of the Artillery Club.

Marking its 75th Anniversary, the Cavalry Club's Annual Dinner was held in the Officers' Mess, Collins Barracks Cork, in November 2019. The Club's President, Colonel Ray O'Léhan presided. The Artillery Club was represented by its President.

Club's Merchandise



The Club's Merchandise includes the following garments and accessories: Jacket, Polo Shirt, Peaker, Tie, and Bow-tie. In 2016, the Artillery Club's Plaque was added to the list of items



in the Club's Clothing Catalogue, maintained by Commandant Chris O'Flanagan (Retd). A Lapel Pin and Tie Clasp were added in 2017. Merchandise is sold on a non-profit basis.

Gunner James Magee



In addition to paying homage to Saint Barbara, its patron saint, the Artillery Corps is unique within the Defence Forces, in that it has an historical figurehead, namely Gunner James Magee, from whom derives the Corps unique esprit de corps, its rich heritage, and its enduring values of professionalism, respect, loyalty, selflessness, physical courage, moral courage and integrity.

Since the establishment of the Artillery Corps on 23 May 1923, Gunner Magee's courage, heroism, and resourcefulness have inspired gunners of all ranks, and his heroic stand during the Battle of Ballinamuck has been commemorated and honoured by the Corps.

In 2018, The Artillery Club commissioned a Paper commemorating and honouring the 220th Anniversary of Gunner Magee's death on 08 September 1798. The comprehensive Paper is based on research carried out by the Artillery Club in August 2018, which derived from existing narratives on Gunner Magee, information from publications and in the print media, and in particular, specific information arising from historical sources, popular culture, folklore, and social memory.



Information on issues relating to Gunner Magee is also included in the Paper: Magee Barracks Kildare, the Magee Gun Trophy, the Battle of Ballinamuck Painting, the Magee March, and the Ballad of Gunner Magee. Club's Direct Support - Curragh Museum

One of the Artillery Club's prescribed objectives is to support military and regimental museums, in the acquisition, preservation, maintenance and display of Artillery weapons, equipment, material and artefacts. In this regard, the Club remains proactive in its support to the Curragh Military Museum.



Attendees at the 2017 AGM unanimously passed a motion: *that the Artillery Club, within its competencies, undertakes to offer to GOC DFTC to organise and maintain the Artillery display in the Curragh Military Museum on behalf of the Artillery Corps.*

The Artillery Club's Working Group, under the leadership of Colonel Brian O'Connor (Retd), which engages with Lieutenant-Colonel Des Healy the museum's curator, provides technical and historical advice, and coordinates the required work to achieve identified objectives within the domain of the Artillery Display, including weapons and equipment.

During 2017, under the auspices of the Artillery Club, the restored main gates of Magee Barracks were placed on permanent display in the museum. Likewise, the Artillery Club secured the loan of one of the surviving Morris Commercial CDSW Quad 6x6 Gun Towers, from the 19 original tractors which went into service in 1938, and paid for its transportation from England, for display in the museum, with its original registration plate ZC 5835.



On Monday 02 December 2019, Colonel Seamus McDermott (Retd) and RSM John Morris (Retd) secured the side gate of Magee Barracks for the Curragh Museum.

In January 2022, the Club's Committee authorised an appropriate contribution of €400 from its museum suspense account, for the purchase and display of a 1930s Artillery Officer's Dress Uniform, including a shako and cross belt – uniform parts which are extremely rare and are of very high value.



Members are encouraged to locate and donate Artillery artifacts and material for display in the Artillery Gallery of the Curragh Museum.



On 26 October 2022, during the Club's Decades' Reunion Lunch, Commandant Martin Hackett (Retd), 23 Infantry Battalion (FCA), kindly presented the Artillery Club with a High Angle Gun Site from a 3.7 inch Ack Ack Gun. Attendees also viewed an Electronic Ignition Firing Gun for a 9 inch Coastal Defence Gun kindly donated by Brigadier-General Brian Cleary, General Officer Commanding 1 Brigade.

Club's Projects



The Artillery Club avails of Projects to achieve its objectives. Examples, in chronological order, include: Battle of Ballinamuck Painting; Chief of Staffs' Portraits, Perpetual Trophy Regimental Survey Courses, Church Window Insert – Artillery Club, UN Peacekeeping Medal – Commandant Thomas Wickham RIP, Restoration and Relocation of Main Gate Magee Barracks, Organisation Chart – 4 Field Artillery Battery 1939 – 1945, and 18pdr Mark II QF Field Gun Serial Number 9168.

Battle of Ballinamuck Painting





Honouring Gunner James Magee, who was killed in action on 08 September 1798, the Artillery Club commissioned an oil on canvas painting of the “Battle of Ballinamuck” (1978) by Thomas Ryan PPRHA.

The painting is the property of the Artillery Club. The painting’s dimensions are: 86.4cm x 111.6cm, and it is mounted on a plain mock gilt, non-glazed frame. The painting was unveiled in the Officers’ Mess Magee Barracks, in 1995. Thomas Ryan PPRHA has had many commissions for portraits and he is also well known for his Irish historical scenes, especially those of the 1916 Rising. He was President of the RHA from 1982 to 1993 and was conferred with the Freedom of the City of Limerick.

On the closure of Magee Barracks, the “Battle of Ballinamuck” painting went on loan to the Officers’ Mess Column Barracks, Mullingar. Following the closure of Columb Barracks, the painting was relocated to Custume Barracks Athlone.

In September 2012, Adam’s Fine Art Auctioneers and Valuers valued the painting at €30,000.00. On 12 June 2013, Major-General P.F. Nowlan (Retd) formally presented the painting on loan from the Artillery Club to the 2 Brigade Artillery Regiment for display in the Officers’ Mess Custume Barracks Athlone. Lieutenant-Colonel Ray Yorke, OC 2 Brigade Artillery Regiment received the painting.

A brass plaque was provided by the Artillery Club marking the loan of the painting. The proprietorial interest if the Artillery Club is noted on the mess property insurance, Officers’ Mess, Custume Barracks, Athlone.

In 2014, the painting was restored by Ciara Brennan MA, of the Conservation of Fine Art. The painting remains on loan from the Artillery Club to the 2 Brigade Artillery Regiment, and remains on display in the Officers’ Mess, Custume Barracks, Athlone.

Mr Thomas Ryan PPRHA was the Guest of Honour at the Club’s Annual Saint Barbara’s Day Lunch held in Custume Barracks, Athlone on 04 December 2014.

Portraits - Chief of Staff

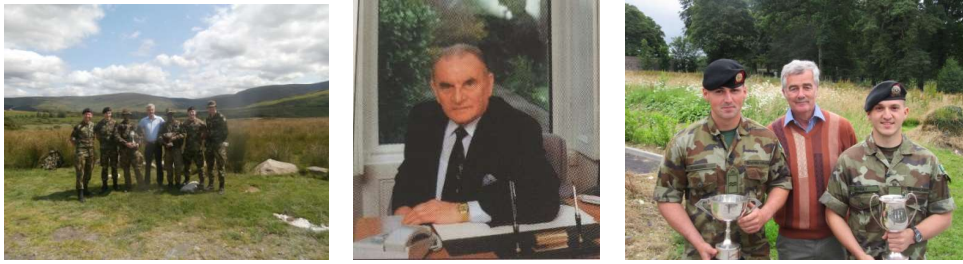


In recognition of the appointment by An tUachtarán of Artillery Corps officers to Chief of Staff, the Artillery Corps commissioned portraits of Lieutenant-Generals Patrick A. Mulcahy, (1955 – 1960), Tadgh O’Neill (1986 – 1989), and Noel Bergin (1992 - 1995). These portraits, and that commissioned by the Artillery Club for Lieutenant-General Conor O’Boyle (2013 - 2015) are on display in the Artillery School.

The Club remains grateful to Commandant Paddy Walshe (Retd) for undertaking the commission of Lieutenant-General O’Boyle’s portrait pro gratus. The portrait was unveiled on Saint Barbara’s Day 2015, in the DFHQ Officers’ Mess.



Perpetual Trophy – Young Officers’ and Detachment Commanders’ [No Is’] Courses



The Captain Jack Jones Perpetual Trophy is awarded to the best placed student on both the Young Officers Course and on Detachment Commanders’ [No 1s’] Courses.

A native of Suncroft, County Kildare, Jack Jones enlisted in Connolly Barracks Curragh Camp, was commissioned as a Temporary Officer during the Emergency, and served with C Company, 13 Infantry Battalion in Waterford, Curragh, New Ross, and Kilkenny. In 1943, with the reorganization of the Artillery Corps, he transferred to the Corps, successfully completing a Young Officers’ Course, (with Lieutenant Tom Wickham).

As a member of the 18 Cadet Class, 2/Lieutenant Jack Jones was commissioned in 1946, appointed to the Artillery Corps, and posted initially to 7 Field Artillery Regiment in Limerick, and thereafter served with 1 Field Artillery Regiment in Ballincollig, 4 Field Artillery Regiment in Mullingar, and the Depot and School Artillery in Kildare.

Retiring early in 1960, Captain Jones was appointed to the Army Reserve, joined the Neilsen organization, and in April 1962, he established MRBI becoming one of the foremost political analysts in Ireland. Following discussions with the Director of Artillery Colonel Jim Prendergast, Captain Jack Jones (Retd) initiated his Perpetual Trophy in 1994.

Perpetual Trophy – Regimental Survey Courses

In 2016, having received approval from Mrs Mary Brown, and in consultation with the Artillery School, the Committee decided that the Artillery Club will sponsor a Perpetual Trophy in the memory of Commandant Dave Brown (Retd) RIP, awarded to the first placed student on the Artillery School’s Regimental Survey Courses.



A native of Dublin, Commandant Dave Brown enlisted as a gunner in the 2 Field Artillery Regiment and was awarded a Cadetship in Óglaigh na hÉireann. Graduating as a member of the 51 Cadet Class, he was commissioned in 1975 and appointed to the 4 Field Artillery Regiment.

Following his Artillery Young Officers' Course, Lieutenant Dave Brown was posted to the Artillery School, where he was renowned for his technical and tactical knowledge. He was first in the Defence Forces to fire the Milan Anti-Tank Missile in Glen Imaal. As a Gunner Officer, Commandant Dave Brown also served in the Depot Artillery, 3 Battery, 6 Field Artillery Regiment (FCA) and 1 Air Defence Regiment.

Serving his country in the cause of peace, Commandant Dave Brown's overseas tours of duty included UNIFIL in Lebanon, UNTAC in Cambodia and MINORSO in Western Sahara. He also served as a Staff Officer in Defence Forces Headquarters and HQ Curragh Command.



The Perpetual Trophy consists of a mounted Director No 7 Mark 5, extensively used by our Field Artillery Units from 1941 up to the early 1970s, when it was replaced by the Director L1A1. The following number is inscribed on the director used as the Trophy: O.S. 1815GA POC 393 o.53910.S.A. The Perpetual Trophy project was successfully overseen by Colonel Seamus McDermott (Retd).

On 13 July 2017, Club members were present in Coolmoney Camp when the Director of Artillery, Colonel Ray Yorke formally opened the Brown Hall, in the presence of the late Commandant Dave Brown's wife Mary, daughter Laura and mother.

On 04 December 2017, the Club President presented the first recipient of the Perpetual Trophy to Gunner Cleary 2 Artillery Regiment. On the same day, the Club President made a formal presentation to RSM John Morris in recognition of his commendable service to the Artillery School and steadfast support to the Artillery Club.



Church Window Insert



On behalf of the Club's Committee, Commandant Richie Armstrong (Retd) coordinated the design and production of a Window Insert for the Garrison Church, McKee Barracks consisting of the Club's Logo.

The window was formally dedicated and blessed by Rev Fr Bob McCabe CF during the Annual Commemorative Mass held on 14 November 2015. The 2 Air Defence Battery's pennant was also laid-up during the Commemorative Mass.

UN Peacekeepers Medal – Commandant Thomas P. Wickham (RIP)



On 23 November 2017, under the auspices of the Artillery Club, at a formal ceremony in the Defence Forces Officers' Mess, Brigadier-General Howard Berney, General Officer Commanding 2 Brigade, presented the United Nations Peacekeepers Medal to Mrs Patricia Wickham, wife of Commandant Thomas (Tommy) P. Wickham RIP.

At the time of his death, Commandant Wickham was deployed to the Golan Heights as an unarmed United Nations Military Observer. Tragically, he was shot and killed by a Syrian soldier, while trying to relieve United Nations observer positions on 07 June, 1967.

The action occurred at a Syrian checkpoint at the old Roman bridge near the village of Ar Rafid on the Golan Heights, in the vicinity of Quineitra, just one day after the start of "The 6 Day War".

A Lecture Room in the Artillery School is dedicated to Commandant Wickham.



Restoration and Relocation of Main Gate – Magee Barracks Kildare



The Artillery Club actively supported Regimental Sergeant-Major John Morris' notable initiative of preserving, restoring, and relocating the gates of the former Magee Barracks, Kildare. The gates, which depict 22 guns deployed in action, guarded the entrance to Magee Barracks, from the late 1930s until the barracks closed in 1998.

Magee Barracks was sold as a result of an auction in February 2016 at a reported price in the region of €8.2 million for the 51.4 acre site. The Club's Committee was encouraged with the attendance of a considerable number of its members at the formal handover of the restored Main Gate of Magee Barracks to the Curragh Museum on 13 April 2017.

Organisation Chart – 4 Field Artillery Battery 1939 – 1945



The Artillery Club received from Mrs Kathern Smyth the framed Organisation Chart of the 4 Field Artillery Battery 1939 - 1945, which was commanded by her father, Lieutenant-Colonel Denis Burke RIP. Colonel Seamus McDermott (Retd) supervised the project, and the Artillery Club remains grateful to Commandant Paddy Walsh (Retd) for his technical and material support. The chart is on display in the Artillery School.

18pdr Mark II QF Field Gun Serial Number 9168





Pursuant to its objectives, the Artillery Club wishes to formally convey its appreciation to the Defence Forces for the authentication, acquisition, recovery, storage, conservation and restoration of the Mark II QF Field Gun, Serial Number 9168 (Civil War Gun), with its distinctive type of recoil system, currently on loan from the Defence Forces, and on display in the Soldiers and Chiefs Exhibition, National Museum of Ireland, Collins Barracks Dublin.

This Field Gun played a significant role in the Irish Civil War of 1922 – 1923, when it was acquired by the new Irish State from the departing British forces. It was likely one of the four Field Guns deployed against the anti-Treaty IRA forces occupying the Four Courts in June 1923. This Field Gun was discovered in the United States of America, authenticated, recovered to Ireland by the Defence Forces, and was successfully restored to its original state by the Ordnance Corps.



During its visit to Ordnance Base Workshops on 21 April 2022, the Artillery Club's President availed of the opportunity of saluting the considerable research, and significant conservation and restoration work undertaken in the Ordnance Base Workshops since 2017 by Captain Daithí O'Flynn, and Armament Artificers Sergeant Robert Delaney (i/c Project), Sergeant Cregan and Sergeant Sexton, under the guidance of Commandant Stephan Mac Eoin, Defence Forces Heritage Officer, Commandant Lar Joye (AR), and assisted by Mr Sven Habermann and Ms Brenda Malone National Museum of Ireland.

From 2016 to 2022, the Artillery Club played a significant oversight role in the project and an overview of the project can be seen on the Club's Website at www.artilleryclub.ie.

Club's Activities





Regarding its activities, the Club acknowledges the encouragement and support provided by the Director of Artillery, the Artillery School, the 1 Brigade Artillery Regiment and the 2 Brigade Artillery Regiment. The Club's activities are of an Artillery nature, appealing to many members. A programme of events is published on a yearly basis and is well supported.

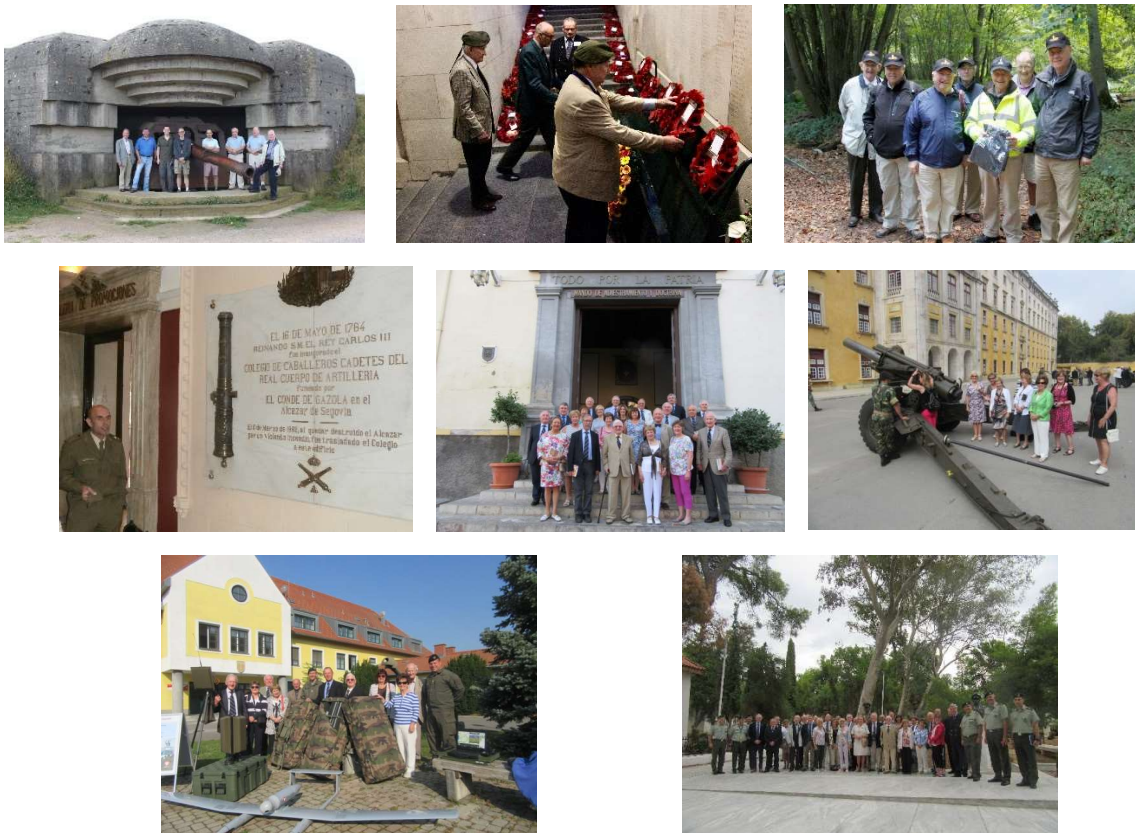


115 Infantry Battalion UNIFIL 04 December 2019

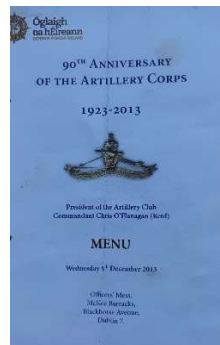
Annual Disbanded Units' Mass
